No Master Maps! All courses will be premarked on your maps. Maps will b- at the start area. When told to go, pick up your course rap and move to the triangle marked on the grass. Control descriptions will be attached to the map. You will still need to fill in a clip card at registration and present it to the starter. Maps (without courses) will be on display. Green course competitors will complete the first part of their course and return to start triangle for their second map.

Green course is physically and technically demanding. Winning time expected to be 67 mins.

Orange course is a short Green in technical difficulty. Winning time is expected to be 41 minutes.

Yellow course is technically easy and the average time is expected to be 30 mins.

White course is also easy and follows line features all the way.

Green and Orange course people may wish to wear leg covering as some of the area marked "rough open" contains dead blackberry, chopped down pines and tall wet grass. A few more helping hands would be appreciated. Phone the number below if you can spare an hour of so to help.

# HINTS FOR NEWCOMERS - 3

#### ON THE COURSE Cont -

- 10. Do not panic if you cannot find the control or think you are lost. Stop and think and try to find out where you are. Do not run about aimlessly hoping the control will appear. Return to your last known position or head for the nearest obvious feature.
- 11. At club events and only if you have run out of ideas, ask someone where you are, but not where the control is. Do not do this on a 'badge event'.
- 12. The map is generally as accurate as the mapper can make it and is his or her interpretation of the area. Other mappers might see the area slightly different and you should allow for this when reading the map.
- 13. Very occasionally a control is in the wrong place, or has the wrong number on it. If you are SURE you are in the right place and there is no control, carry on and mention it at the finish. If the wrong number is on the control and you are SURE it is yours, punch it and mention it at the finish, These mistakes are seldom made.
- 14. If injured, blow your whistle six short blasts followed by a long pause and then repeated is the recognised distress signal. You should not use your whistle if you are merely lost. If you hear a distress signal you should stop your course and locate the injured person. Note where you are on the map in case you need to seek assistance.
- 15. ALWAYS report to the finish, whether you complete your course or not, otherwise other orienteers may start searching for you at the end of the day, believing you to be lost or injured.

#### AFTER THE EVENT -

- Discuss with other competitors the route choices they took. Draw on your map the actual route you took, and work out where you made mistakes and how to do better next time.
- Analyze your course's and see if you are making the same mistakes each event. For example if you always have trouble with the first control, then start more slowly walk if necessary if you often have problems. On long legs maybe your concentration is wandering.

# PLANNER'S COMMENT ON FAIRFIELD EVENT

As most people can imagine, when using a street map like Fairfield creating legs with route choice is quite difficult. The only way I found was to make the legs long. I also felt the courses I set were very similar to the last Fairfield event.

Personally I was very pleased with the turn-out, especially with the string course. There were youngsters doing it before Dad (the controller) and I had finished rolling out the string and some even did it four or five times. One of the more amusing



incidents was a very young orienteer who had dashed ahead of her parents on the , final straight. The string ended about three short of the finish table (so that others would not be tripped up) and when she reached the end she stopped dead and looked quite just confused, metres short of the Finish!

We were very lucky with the weather. the only hazard was the wind blowing the finish and start sheets around, but that was better than if it had been raining as well.

The two changes I made to the usual events was using the IOF symbol control descriptions (as well as the normal written ones) for the Green and Orange courses which was really to add a bit of interest. I also divided the Yellow course into two, Yellow `A' and Yellow `B'. The Yellow `B' course was intended to be one step up from the string course. While the Yellow `A' was of the same technical difficulty but with extra length.

Thanks to Gary Renwick for his help during the day, Peter Syms for helping after the event and everyone else who made it happen.

# COURSE for MAPPERS 6 June

Earlier this month Ken Holst the NZOF Technical Officer came down to Nelson and held a course for club mappers. In addition to the mapping, a Saturday evening session on course setting was also held. Ken's travel costs from his home in Rotorua were provided by NZOF using a grant from the Hillary Commission.

Club members Ian B, Graham A, Martin E, Colin H, Doug M, Ian M, Don S, Margot S and also Peter S started off the day at Waimea Intermediate School with two hours of theory. We concentrated on the field survey part of mapping, only briefly touching the methods used in cartography (drawing up) and printing.

After an area suitable for orienteering has been found and the owners permission has been given, a search is made for the best possible existing maps or airphotos which can be used as a base to start from. We were aware that the farm around the Ngawhatu Hospital looked good, lots of hilly ground but not steep, and also lots of detail in the way of winding streams, slips and banks, and here and there some trees and scrub. The farmer was agreeable and we had an old 1:25,000 map with 15 metre contours. The Hospital lent us a framed air photo and we obtained another from Aerial Surveys Ltd.

SpeedyPrint enlarged the map to 1:5000 using laser print not photo copy and Ken inserted 2 extra contours between each existing one to give us 5 metre ones. A photocopy of just one small part of the map (about 200m x 400m) was given to each of us, which we then covered with draughting film and with a fine 0.5mm lead pencil, our trusty compass, a rubber and a knowledge of pacing we were ready to have a go.

It was a case of walking over every piece of ground, correcting the map where required and adding detail which the orienteer needs. After two hours or so we got back together and compared our work, all of the same area. It was pleasing to see that all maps looked pretty much the same. After the cartographer has copied all the field work onto a single base map and reduced it to a final scale of 1:10000 it should look alright.

# HOW TO SET GOOD COURSES

In the evening we were joined by Jackie H, Tim H, Paul H, Bill H, Chris M and Jo K. Ken Holst with the aid of coloured slides and a rapidly moving whiteboard marker pen led us carefully through a minefield of information. After two and half hours we still had more questions but it was about enough for one session.

A good map is an obvious necessity for orienteering, but just as important is a course setter who knows how to plan courses so they will be fair, and enjoyable. The element of luck must be reduced to the minimum. The navigational problems appropriate to the experience of the orienteer. The right mixture of physical challenge and mental test.

Thanks Ken, the NZOF and the Hillary Commission for the help which will enable us to put on more enjoyable orienteering.

#### THE NZOF ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The New Zealand Orienteering Federation (NZOF) Annual General Meeting is held in conjunction with a multi-day event, so that delegates from as far apart as Invercargill and Whangarei can enjoy three or four days of orienteering, as well as attending the AGM. This year it was held at Easter in Wellington, during a four day event. One delegate from each of the 22 NZ clubs should attend and each delegate carries 1 vote for each 25 or part of 25 members, in our case Doug Mackintosh represented our club with 3 votes for our 60 members last year.

For the rest of the year outside the AGM, the routine management and minor decision making for NZ Orienteering is made by a small management committee consisting of a chairperson, vice-chairperson, vsecretary and treasurer who meet bi-monthly to handle the hundreds of national and international matters that

flow into the secretary's letterbox.

As a democratic organisation any of you as club members can put your opinions/suggestions to the club committee which then decides if or not to take it further to the AGM. At the AGM each club delegate votes as his/her committee has directed, this can include authority to vote at their own personal discretion after hearing views put forward by other clubs.

Of the 22 NZ clubs, 14 were represented, 4 sent proxy votes, 3 were not represented, and 1 did not have a vote. During the meeting 3 members had to leave early which barely left a forum of 11 clubs. It was a bit disappointing for the one chance a year to express democratically the wishes of our 1,400 or so members.

The NZOF Newsletter contains extracts from the meeting and our Secretary holds a full copy of the minutes for any member to see. Other items that may be of interest are:

Affiliation Fees for 1993 remain the same as 1992

(Senior \$16, Junior \$10, Family \$42) (We pay next year) The NZOF budget was approved with very little change. Only 7 clubs stated they had applied for Hillary Funds. Laurie Baxter and Judy Martin have dropped their commitment to Kiwisport Orienteering to concentrate on other 0 activities. The remit requesting support for the proposed World Cup in Auckland 1994 was withdrawn pending more information. The APOC meeting in Wellington 1994 is proceeding to plan. The Nationals are to be held earlier in the year, possible May or June (from 1994)

A levy will not be raised to support MAPSport (lost 22/23) A week's orienteering camp and conference to be held at St Arnaud Dec 92/Jan 93 (Not a TOP responsibility)

Michael Wood gave a briefing on the state of coaching and the production of the Development plan.
