### **Editorial**

A big thanks to Greg and Carina for attending the National Conference and AGM, where our national business is finalised for the past year and budget approved for the coming one. It was well attended, well run and I think enjoyed by all. Big thanks to Hutt Valley for their efforts in organisation and the Branches and HQ staff who package all the administrative requirments for the event.

A welcome to new president Callum Sheridan (past VP), new Vice President Hamish Orr (Kapiti) and South Island rep. Mark Elliotte of Upper Clutha (that's Otago region!). A farewell to Craig as past President and Ian Owen (thanks for your many years work!). Full report from your team below.



The National Wild Goat Hunt Competition is back on for 2024.

Remember that some locals won some pretty amazing prizes last year and there's even more up for grabs this time around. To reduce work we are planning to hold only three open days to bring in tails. These will be in Murchison, Motueka and Stoke, likely all on the same day. DOC folks will be running the ones away, and NZDA locally in Stoke. Heads need to be brought to the NZDA open day. So, keep your tails in the freezer and read all the details below by visiting the website link provided. The competition is attracting interest as per the request for skins for turning into works of art and cultural heritage, it's great to see folks seeking value from all parts of the animal and I hope hunters can provide a few skins.

Had a video meeting with the OSPRI folks very recently (and with Nelson, Marlborough and North Canterbury branches) so they could keep us up to speed with their work eradicating TB from NZ and in particular the Upper South Island. Key points were that major commercial stock herds such as Molesworth are now testing clear. There is plenty of background monitoring too, especially testing in ferrets (Molesworth have caught 200 for testing) and pigs. The last aerial work in the top of the South is occurring now in the Clarence area with the north end of Clarence receiving repellent. The recent drop in the Rainbow is not planned to be repeated although again monitoring of the stock and vectors (possums) will continue.

The best news is there are no further aerial operations planned for our end of the Island for 2025 or 26. There is however, ongoing work on West Coast and further south (Otago region) and OSPRI will connect with and talk to those regional branches about these ops. It was interesting seeing their maps of the extent of ground trapping/poisoning and monitoring which is a lot more extensive than we had thought, given our focus and concerns with aerial drops. We have asked for more information on this as it provides context to the overall programme, and I hope we can share in the next Echo. In the meantime, if you have a interest their programmes throughout the country can be seen here OSPRI Pest Control by Region

On the weekend 12<sup>th</sup> – 14<sup>th</sup> July Greg and myself headed to Wellington to attend the NZDA 76<sup>th</sup> Conference hosted by Hutt valley Lower Hutt Branch.

Hutt Valley did an outstanding job hosting the 76<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference, not only that they put together the very first NZDA Hunting and Wildlife Expo. The Expo featured around 26 stallholders and conservation organisations, the Expo saw over 2000 people through the doors on Saturday.

### **REQUEST FOR GOAT SKINS**

Kahu kurī (dog skin cloaks) were made of strips of dog skin taken from the kurī (Māori dog) before the kurī became extinct. Kahu kurī are prestigious garments possessing great mana (prestige) and were highly-prized heirlooms. Sadly, most now remain anonymous in museum collections around the world. The possession of a kahu kurī immediately identified the owner as a rangatira - someone of prestige and position within the hapū (sub-tribe) or iwi (tribe).





Kia ora, my name is Shanell, I am born and brought up in Nelson and a passionate weaver looking to restore cultural practices of cloak making.

An alternative to dog skin for making Kahu kurī is utilising goat skin. I am putting out a request to hunters if you can support this mahi please let me know. I appreciate that it may not be practical to retrieve the skin but if the opportunity arises I would greatly appreciate and come to collect.




## Molesworth Mission by Dave Woods



When Richard Wells offered a chance to explore a block in Molesworth station it was an easy "yes". After an early morning drive from Nelson, a gear dump at the Hanmer Springs Forestry Camp we were on the hill by midday. We made use of the easy rolling access to the higher ground and gave plenty of glass time to the surrounding hills and gullies. There was a surprising amount of fresh sign even on the lower-level access trails. We enjoyed beautiful conditions with a light wind in our face and balmy temperatures for this time of year. [The editor says the photo opposite is not reflective of this "balmy" weather as it was taken next day when it was pretty jolly cold.]



The first action of the day started with a quiet mutter from Richard "chamois". This was confirmed when I turned my glasses to the gully in question and could count six black dots conspicuous amongst the flax and scree. The dots were in no apparent hurry to move and this then prompted considerable debate as to whether these were actually a target animal for our current stalk.



We eventually gained the high ground on a bluff overlooking the gully. The chamois were still in the same spot approx. 350 mtrs distant. Only two animals were visible and only one offered any decent shot. Decision made and the first shot was taken.....




At this point it became like the slowmotion clip from the movie "Matrix". The first chamois dropped and 5 other chamois heads popped up from various positions up the gully. The shot echoed around the gully at which point I distinctly heard Richard say "oh shit". Richard dropped his camera for his rifle, a second round was chambered and a cloistered cluster of confused chamois erupted onto the surrounding scree slopes. Richard tracked a shot into second animal which promptly dropped and wedged behind a rock on the face of a rocky bluff. No trophies, no venison but a great way to spend a weekend and explore a beautiful part of the country. The forestry camp is a fantastic venue - affordable and offering all the amenities while being near the Molesworth blocks.

#### **NELSON MARLBOROUGH FISH & GAME REPORT**



BUILDING WETLANDS THAT DON'T NEED A CONSENT: in conjunction with Landcare Trust and funding from Westpac, Fish & Game Officer Lawson Davey has assisted with a couple of demonstration projects in the Moutere Catchment to showcase what can be done under the Tasman District Council permitted activity rules, and how cheaply wetlands can be constructed in the right location. Landcare Trust and Lawson helped select appropriate sites and worked with the Council to confirm the sites didn't need consents as well as providing technical advice & oversight of the wetland construction projects. One wetland cost \$4700 in digger time which used a contractor. The second one the landowner built it himself using his digger at a cost of \$600 in diesel. Mahana School will be helping with planting it up.


**BELL ISLAND SWAN/GOOSE CULL:** Recently 35 hunters met at Bell Island to try and lower the swan and goose population. Unfortunately, swan numbers were much lower than they had been a few days prior with only 15 or so birds on the pond. After a go at the Canada geese, where around 10 birds were taken, the group also put a dent in the swan numbers, culling another 10 or so birds. A follow up pukeko hunt revealed no birds seen, an unusual outcome considering the high numbers taken on a previous hunt here.

**FEATHERS PATAKA:** We are setting up a formal feather repository (pataka) for weavers to access feathers from. Ultimately we plan to make this available to all 9 lwi within this region for sourcing feathers for weaving korowai (cloaks).

**REGULAR SEASON HAS CONCLUDED:** The regular season has concluded, however, it is still possible to hunt quail, swan and pukeko during August - check the regulations for exact dates.
