As per the meeting notes provided in the last edition of the Echo, OSPRI are proposing/planning some significant aerial 1080 programmes to control TB via possum reduction across NZ and some of these plans affect top of the South. We are in communication with Marlborough and Golden Bay branches (as well as OSPRI) on this matter. Whilst it appears that repellent will be used in the Clarence area, at present the draft plan advises that the Rainbow area will not get repellent due to risk to kea. We advocate for repellent in any aerial 1080 drop and note no evidence to support that repellent increases risk to kea, which is the key point here. Submissions are due at the end of the month and we will be submitting on behalf of the branch in collaboration with other Branches and national Office. I encourage people to make considered submissions themselves as individuals, see link here OSPRI Submission

The Police are issuing more information around Firearms Laws and requirements (see under Range Matters) not least seeking submissions regarding registry which will of course take up executive time...but you can have your say too Police Firearms Registry Submission Make it considered and make it count!





Introducing MyFirearms and online forms - 15 August 2022

The introduction of **MyFirearms** is one of the steps we are taking to modernise our work around firearms and become an effective regulator of the Arms Act.

New videos and updated guidance for secure storage and transportation of firearms and ammunition - 15 Aug 2022

On 1 February 2022, new <u>regulations for firearms and ammunition storage and transport</u> came into effect, which affect all standard firearms licence holders.

To help you understand the changes we've released a <u>series of videos</u> on topics like installation, property security, cable locks, secure ammunition storage, transport and motorhomes/caravans.

The videos demonstrate what set up and the type of equipment you may need to fully comply with the regulations. The videos on transport will be of particular interest if you travel with firearms and ammunitions for hunting or recreational purposes.

We've also updated the <u>Secure Storage Guidance for Firearms and Ammunition document</u> dated June 2022, with better photos so it's easier to see how to comply.


WHAT NOT TO DO! by Alan Drake

Some time back you may remember a couple of books Nelson NZDA made available to members about trapping. These were published by the Department of Conservation in June 2021 and reflect best practice and the latest technical information at this date. The DOC website does not highlight anything contrary by way of updates to what is found in the book.

As such, I was disappointed on one of my many walks in a heavily trapped area to find a few box traps that did not meet these very clear guidelines. Specifically the dimensions of the entrance. This is very important so non-target species (birds for example) cannot enter the trap – and die.

You will see from the photos that the design principles have not been met and the subsequent result. I realise that Blackbirds are an introduced species, and they probably fill a niche that our natives should be filling. However, I cannot help thinking that there are numerous wee native birds hoping around the forest floor that would also love to get at the peanut butter lure in the back of the box and if a black bird can get in...so can they. I would also suggest that DOC or Forest and Bird or other (I do not know who ultimately owns, set, or is responsible for the traps I saw) probably would rather not catch birds of any type in their box traps – hence the very clear construction guidelines – 4 mesh wide x 4 mesh high.

So have a look at the pictures below of what the results can be when you do not follow the code of practice. I am hoping upon finding this bird they change the traps accordingly. I'll let you know.



NELSON MARLBOROUGH FISH & GAME REPORT



ANNUAL FISHERIES REPORT COMPLETED: The 2021-22 annual fisheries report has been completed and is available on the Nelson Marlborough F&G website. The report provides a snapshot to what F&G staff and the Council has been up to over the year, including results from drift dives, trout releases, RMA advocacy work etc.

FARM CLEAN-UPS UNDERWAY: Fish & Game are holding a number of farm clean-up events in the Rai Valley area - helping out farmers who were badly hit by the recent flood event. Last year we held a number of days in the aftermath of the July Motueka flood (totaling 360 volunteer hours), which were very well received by the rural community. More help is needed now, and no doubt with future flood events across the region.

RANGER TRAINING COURSE: Every three years our compliance team, made up of 5 staff and 12 honorary rangers, undertake Situational Safety and Tactical Communications training. This tri-annual 'refresher' arms our rangers with expertise in what to do when things go wrong, mostly negative interactions with anglers and hunters. Thankfully, these instances are rare but, on occasion, do happen, and we have to keep the safety of our staff and voluntary rangers at the forefront.

ACCESS TRACKS: Staff will be busy over the coming month going around our 200+ angler access points in the region. Work here generally involves cutting/widening tracks, spraying/weed control, replacing signage, and in some cases working with landowners to bring in new access points, or modify existing ones if circumstances change.


