The AGM was held on Wednesday 25th July in the Multi Purpose Hall at Tasman School. Twenty-three members attended along with our local Councillors and the new



CEO of the TDC Lindsay McKenzie.

Prior to the commencement of the meeting Fiona Newey, the Executive Officer of the Nelson Tasman Cycle Trails Trust, gave a presentation about the progress of the Great Taste cycle trail with particular reference to the business and recreational opportunities this could offer to our area. Fiona showed us the proposed route on a large scale map and we discussed the opportunities for and actions needed to entice bikers off the main trail on to a Tasman/Kina side trip and so bring business to our locality. Having presented his report to the AGM on a very active year for the Association, Hamish Rush stood down from the Chair and Tony Clark was elected as the new Chairperson. After many years of knowledgeable and dedicated service Colin Rush resigned from the Board and Gillian Pollock and Anna Weeks were elected as new Board members. We are delighted to welcome both Gillian and Anna who will "even up" the gender balance on the Board and in Anna's case continue the long standing tradition of having the Tasman Store "represented" on the Board. Colin was made an Honorary Life Member of the Association in recognition of the huge contribution to the community he has made over the years. The list of current Board members and their contact details are recorded elsewhere in this publication.

Our Treasurer Ewen Griffiths presented the audited Financial Report for the year. The Association is in a good financial position with a balance of just over \$9000 in the Bank at the year end of 30th June 2012. The majority of these funds are earmarked for projects in the Tasman Domain, to support the School Centenary celebrations next year and for other walkway and reserve works in our area. Subscriptions remain unchanged at \$2 per individual and \$5 per family (see the form on the last page of this Tasman Times to join).


Kina Beach Reserve

Always a delightful spot to visit, the Reserve and beachfront are being maintained in good order with an eclectic mix of modern and traditional vans and trucks always in evidence.

Roger and Roseanne are now "gearing up" for the summer season. There have been a few changes to the parking/camping rules, so keep an eye out for the signage.

Other Local Works

The Baldwin Road flood relief work is underway and should be finished by Christmas.





We are in discussions with Council and the NZTA to get additional/modified signage in a couple of locations around the area to clear up apparent confusion on routes for motorists and bikers.

Old Mill Site-Kina Beach Road

The working bees over the past few months have focused on keeping on top of new Broom, Gorse and Pampas growth, whilst opening up the undergrowth in the north eastern "bush" which is now well established. The walking track around the site has been marked out and we have moved earlier plantings from the track as necessary. Whilst we are still some years away from "conversion" to an adopted TDC Reserve, a measure of our progress could be drawn from the recent grant from Council to enable us to acquire tables and benches for use within the site.



Working Bees have now finished for the summer months but will re-commence in April. If you can spare an hour or so on the first Saturday of each month from 10am, do come along and join us – we have an enjoyable morning – usually with tea, buns and a chat around 11am.

Blind Bend Walkway

The Walkway on the blind bend is in place to the full extent we wanted, thanks to a last minute top up of funds from TACA & TDC and a "mates rates" contract from Concrete and Metals. If you have youngsters using the road, PLEASE ensure they use the walkway

The shed was the only original building left from when we arrived here 21 years ago, having originally been the cow-bail in the days before home delivery. It is in times of need that we find out what a great community Tasman is. Neighbours came to help immediately with chainsaws and tractor and within three hours we had access again, and the start of a large pile of firewood and some sawn timber to build the new shed with.

We have just got our first lot of chicks as the start of the flock of hens, we hope, will be able to supply the café with eggs. The field beyond the café, planted with wild flowers and a herbal ley is destined to become their free range, while the 'Palais de Poulet" is still under construction.

Ruby Coast Walkways & Cycleways

We are delighted to advise that we have been working with Mike Tasman-Jones at TDC on the production of a new walkways and cycleways brochure for the Ruby Coast which complements their Richmond & Motueka series of "Get Moving" walking and cycling pathways brochures.

It is due out before Xmas and will be widely distributed throughout the Ruby Coast.

Coastal Initiative Group (CIG) Gateway Sculpture Project

Tasman Tidy-up

The Community Service team has been busy working in school areas until recently. They have now returned to Tasman to resume their tasks of trying to clear some Pampas grass heads and general trimming work. The TDC timeline of 19th Oct 2012 indicated the reduced frequency of grass cutting of verges etc. to quote:

....."Council has adjusted its roadside mowing regime, cutting less often and freeing up funds for other projects. From now on verges will be trimmed twice a year in October and February but may vary according to growing conditions. In the past, cutting was based on grass height and might be trimmed three or four times a year, says Transportation Maintenance Engineer Selwyn Steedman"......

We are lucky to have the C.S attend our area as they will be covering the shortfall and cut the verges near the Information sign and across the road. They will also be tending to the Tasman Domain.

Vet's Voice - Chocolate poisoning in dogs

Xmas is nearly upon us once again and with it comes the obligatory increase in chocolate consumption. While for us humans our main concern with eating chocolate is its effect on our waistlines, for our dogs eating too much chocolate can be life threatening.

Chocolate and cocoa powder contain the active ingredient theobromine which our canine companions cannot metabolise as easily as we can. Too much theobromine can lead to some serious consequences in dogs. Symptoms seen include restlessness, drooling, increased thirst, vomiting (sometimes with blood) and difficulty standing or walking. In severe cases this can progress to muscle tremors, convulsions and death.

So how much chocolate is too much? Unfortunately there is no simple answer, as it depends on the type of chocolate and the size of the dog. Milk chocolate is less toxic than dark chocolate and cocoa powder. We have a useful toxicity calculator which we use to determine the likelihood of poisoning but it is very dependent on knowing how much chocolate the dog has eaten. The answer to that is invariably "the whole box" or "a whole cake"!

As there is no antidote, treatment relies on making the dog vomit if we get to see it immediately (there's nothing quite like chocolatey vomit!). Once symptoms have developed then all we can do is treat these with intravenous fluids, anticonvulsants and antinausea drugs.

So the take home message is not to leave boxes of chocolate nicely wrapped under the Xmas tree. A hungry canine will think this is gift to him, but he will not be thanking you later!


TACA website developments


The TACA website is undergoing a refit. After some discussion it has been decided to update the website and add a news / blog to it. With the update it is hoped to have the website achieve the following:


- Provide timely relevant information

Rare Visitors to Kina

Twice a year the ornithological society does a census of coastal bird life. All estuaries, beaches and coastal paddocks etc throughout the country are surveyed and a tally done for each species. The Moutere Inlet, from the old mill site to Motueka wharf and including the embayments, islands and beaches, normally has from 15 to 18 species, including several migratory species, and totals to up to 800 birds.

During the summer 2012 census, 60 wrybill were seen on the outer beach towards the end of the Kina Peninsula. This was a first sighting for Kina and the birds remained there for several days, resting while on their annual migration from

Canterbury braided river nesting sites.

These are unique birds, the only species in the world to have a beak curving to the right which aids in foraging amongst the shingle for food.

Banded dotterel and variable oystercatchers, both endemic, attempt to nest on this same beach. It would be good if this area could be protected from vehicles and other disturbance at least during the nesting months.
