#### From The Chair

Wow – once again a huge few months by TACA and the community. As a small community we have again managed to achieve huge things.



The first, of course, is bringing Baigent Reserve back into public use and ownership. In partnership with TDC and the community, Baigent Reserve was purchased from Cart Holt Harvey for use as a public domain. Thank you to all those who contributed and to those who supported the process. A special thanks to Hamish Rush from TACA who spearheaded the campaign and put in many hours of work (along with Ron Oliver and David Easton).

The bus shelter outside the Tasman Store is under construction as this is being written. A decision was made to construct the shelter offsite, and then move it to outside the store once completed. This allowed many of the safety aspects to be addressed. Look out for it appearing beside the road shortly.

The Tasman Reserve continues to be enhanced, with the underpass now painted (and it looks great) and more trees added to the edible orchard. A new picnic table has been placed on site, beside the stream, as we are expecting more people to use the domain. This community asset is really coming together.

The Great Taste Trail is still coming through the village, at this stage it is intended to go straight along Aporo Road, subject to getting approval from TDC and the Cycle Trails Trust. Should the route change, then we will let the community know. As part of bringing the cycle trail along Aporo Road, we may need to look at the speed limits through the village.

The old sawmill site has really started to come together, with the many trees and shrubs starting to grow, making the area a picturesque spot. The group who meet and work regularly are really starting to win the battle against the gorse, pampas and convolvulus. Thank you to all who participate and help, particularly Tony Pearson who continues to drive this project forward (and provides coffee and muffins for the workers!).

TACA is working with Civil Defence to put in place a plan should Tasman have a natural disaster. Anna Weeks is coordinating this plan, so keep an eye out for more information regarding this.

TACA would like to take this opportunity to thank all the community for their continuing support of projects and wish you all a safe and happy festive season. I personally cannot wait to see what we achieve in 2014.

#### Admin Stuff

The AGM was held at the end of July and if we discount the attendance of the Board of Trustees and local Councillors only 8 members of the community felt it worthwhile or necessary to attend. We trust this is a reflection of the



satisfaction you generally have with the actions and results achieved by the present Board? Certainly the events of the last few months have shown that the Community is aware – and does care - about what is going on in our area – long may it continue – even if AGM's fail to spark that enthusiasm.

Whatever the reason, those of you who did not attend, missed a somewhat startling presentation by Joe Kennedy from the Nelson/Tasman Civil Defence organisation which, whilst outlining the good preparations that the organisation has made to deal with community wide emergencies of all sorts, left no doubt in our minds that, initially at least, we will be on our own locally – a situation that has been tragically demonstrated by the latest disaster in the Philippines, where small communities have been cut off from National and International aid and have been forced to fend for themselves in the immediate aftermath of a disaster.

Suffice it to say that there was enough concern among all those present to initiate a plan that will provide the basis of a local "first responder" organisation for Tasman – more on this elsewhere in this newsletter.

The Board was re-elected "en bloc" at the meeting and Board members retained their designated positions. We farewell Gillian Pollock who has moved out of the district and thank her for her well-considered input to the Board over the last few years – our loss is Mapua's gain as she will remain active in their Community as well as her well beloved Forest and Bird commitment.

The meeting saw the first unveiling of the Gateways Maquette – the scale model of the project planned for the entrance to Tasman – again more on this later in the newsletter.

In spite of the very tight financial restrictions on Council this year TACA did well in its application for funding. We were granted our usual operating funds and

additionally a \$10,000 allocation to upgrade the playground equipment at the Tasman Reserve. Subsequent meetings with TDC have all but guaranteed a really great new space for the children of the community to enjoy.

#### **Local Reserves**

### **Tasman Reserve**

It's now three years since the bypass opened and after all the upheaval and reconstruction the Tasman Reserve is looking in pretty good shape and being well used.

#### **Open Orchard**

Also now in it's third year is the open orchard and this year for the first time there will be produce available, starting with plums in the new year.

This winter a grant of \$500 from the Fonterra 'grassroots fund' allowed another substantial planting of nuts and citrus trees and then a gift of 12 heritage apples from the estate of Doug Simpson, well known Nelson apple breeder, further enhanced this planting. These apple trees are through the underpass on the western side.

Feel free to go down to the reserve with your basket when the fruit comes ripe and help yourselves; that is what it is there for.

#### **Underpass Mural**

Some interesting recent improvements have been completed including the mural on the underpass. This project was initiated and funded by the Tasman Area Community Association to add another level of interest to the reserve and as a way to deter the graffiti that was starting to appear in the underpass.



The project was designed and led by local graphic artist, Adi Tait, who then had help from community members with the actual painting. The result is an outstanding hidden gem, which gives real pleasure every time you go through the underpass.

The bird images Adi has used are a direct reference to the design of the Gateway Sculpture that is planned for the entrance to the village.

## New playground equipment

The next project in the reserve is the playground which doesn't meet council safety regulations and funding is available for an upgrade. Any of you who have taken kids there recently will understand some of these issues.

The plan is to retain the rustic nature of the playground but to upgrade equipment and redesign it to have more connection with the reserve by removing the fence at the back, to include the trees in the play area.

Some new and some recycled equipment from other playgrounds will be used to make the most of the limited funding.

## Kina Beach Reserve

With summer fast approaching Roger and Roseanne are bracing themselves for the usual busy season but the last month or so – whilst quiet during the week - has been busy at weekends. The Reserve is looking quite trim although would benefit from some expenditure on decent BBQ facilities – Roger is managing in the meantime with used oil drums. The beach is in good condition and

Roger says the snapper are about! With the Baigent Reserve now available again the Kina Reserve should be under reduced pressure from family picnickers at weekends and over the holidays – but it is still a hard venue to beat!

#### **Old Mill Site-Kina Beach Road**

We are shortly to stop work on the site for the summer months but there will be one last "bash" to halt the inevitable convolvulus growth – scheduled for the morning (0900hrs) of Saturday December 14<sup>th</sup> – if you have a burning desire to vent your pent up emotions on something – come and join us, ripping convolvulus off native growth!!

## Tasman's Great Taste Cycle Trail

The next big change to come to Tasman is the imminent arrival of the Great Taste Trail. The trail building is quite visible now with the section from Marriages Road to Horton Road along Aporo Rd being built as the Tasman Times goes to print.

Tenders have been let for the next section on Aporo Rd from Horton Road to Kina Beach Road and hopefully this will be finished before Xmas.

There was a lot of concern from residents about the route through the village and disturbances to quiet village life and, following a public meeting, the agreed route is now using Aporo Road, between Baldwin and Dicker Roads.

The arrival of more bikes in our area means we will have to take extra care when driving, especially on those roads that are not part of the trail but where there will be more cycle traffic, particularly the Kina Beach roads.

## **Walking tracks & Paper Roads**

The opening up the Dicker Ridge Track (a former Paper Road) has been a highlight of TACA's recent achievements – many thanks to David Short for project-leading this - BUT some members of our community (and perhaps further afield) decided it would make a good 4x4 track as well – after the damage to "pedestrian and horse only" gates were repaired from local funds and NZTA, the State Highway authority, has taken steps to ensure this unwelcome activity was terminated by the provision of locked gate and berms/culverts at strategic points.





## **Civil Defence Emergency Management in Tasman**

#### **Civil Defence Centres**

During emergencies a Civil Defence Centre will open to support our community if we are affected by an emergency event. In our area this will be either at Tasman School or the Tasman Bible Church depending on the emergency, areas involved and accessibility.

We have a local Liaison Officer who in the event of an emergency is in contact with Nelson Tasman Emergency Management Group who oversee the situation. The Civil Defence Centre provides support to access financial, clothing, accommodation, insurance, food and other essential services. In the event, you will be advised where the Centre will be opened.

It is expected that individuals need to be able to provide for themselves and their household for up to three days or more. Radio stations Classic Hits 89.6 FM, More FM 92.8 or Fresh FM 104.8 will all broadcast local information in the event of an emergency. You can also call Tasman District Council 24 hour line who will inform you of your nearest Civil Defence Centre, information about the emergency event, or take your details if more information or support is required. Please also check the website <a href="https://www.nelsontasmancivildefence.co.nz">www.nelsontasmancivildefence.co.nz</a> to receive up to date information.

#### **Emergency Supplies**

In most emergencies you should be able to stay in your own home. However you may be forced to evacuate, so it is important to be aware of hazards on the road, and have emergency items that can be readily accessed. For example:

- torch
- radio or your cellphone may have a radio
- wind and waterproof clothing, strong outdoor shoes
- First aid kit and essential medicines
- sleeping bags
- pet supplies
- toilet paper
- face and dust mask
- Food and water for at least three days; non-perishable food, water at least 3 litres per person per day, camp stove, can opener
- Cash eftpos is unavailable in a power cut
- Photocopies of passports/driver's licence/birth certificates

This is the start of a greater clean up and plan for the reserve which will be undertaken over the next five years or so.

Security and the ongoing management of the reserve will be handled by TDC with the help of TACA and the wider community; new signs have been erected, stating no overnight camping at the Reserve. The gate will remain unlocked at this point, but if it is seen to be necessary, the gate may be locked at night in the future to keep out the trouble makers.

## **Tasman School Update**

In the fourth term, schools seem to have the foot on the accelerator all the time. Everything has to be completed, or fitted in before the end of the year. Reports, concerts, camps, projects, gardens, you name it.

Having said that, our senior students did go on camp in the third term, because it had been planned for two years. Every second year the camp is in Wellington, where the students have a cultural city experience of Te Papa, the Zoo, Weta Workshops, CapitalE, and Parliament. The fundraising for this started way back with 'Muffin Mondays', and 'Sushi Fridays', prepared by the students and parents. We always get a full report on their return, and the younger students anticipate their turn. But now...

### Muddy Buddies - Congratulations!

To all the Room Four students – and their representatives: Jordan, Lillian, Tiare and Hannah who ably spoke to judges at the recent Cawthron



Institute Science Fair.

Their entry – on the monitoring of the Moutere Inlet after Muddy Buddies – won the Nelson Tasman Environment Award and \$500. There were 151 entries – the vast majority from senior secondary students, so this was high praise!

Judges were very impressed with the commitment our students demonstrated to making a difference, over an 18-month period. Thanks to Megan Wilson, the region's "Experiencing Marine Resources" educator – who did a fantastic job supporting our students in their scientific enquiry.

Muddy Buddies has featured recently in media – not entirely accurately. I am yet to see any letters to the editor in support of our achievement or the event. We have worked over an 18-month period with people from EMR, DoC and Forest & Bird to minimise the impact this event has on the estuary with significant success.

Our students have regularly gone into the estuary – not only to monitor but also pick up rubbish, and

protect inanga spawning grounds. They had a significant part to play in setting the course to ensure delicate ground cover and possible nesting areas were avoided.

We are an "Enviro school" and take our role in building children's awareness and sense of responsibility for our environment very seriously.

The consultant report to the TDC noted, "the impact of Muddy Buddies is considered relatively minor and reversible". Copies are available if anyone who is interested in the full report. The significant issue for our estuary is sedimentation. The Tasman District Councillors were supportive of our event and have allowed us to work with TDC staff this year to continue to minimise and mitigate against the potential impact of this popular event. We know the enjoyment it creates – and the opportunity for highlighting the value of our environment at the same time.

It will be run on 9 March next year, so put it in your calendar. So 'Muddy Buddies,' slosh on!

The 'Tasman Touring Troupe' is on the road again! Each year Room 3 students, (year 4-5) take their concert of recorders, uke's and puppets on the road to visit some playcentres, rest homes and hospitals, as part of a education unit on community. It takes a lot of preparation but the rewards are significant. The students become empowered, and the community enjoys a concert. Our Troupe is going as far as Salisbury Girls School this year.



And next year? Tasman School has a groundswell of younger pupils attending, so a reshuffling is needed. The beauty of a small school is that teachers can have the students for more than one year, and so a real relationship can grow, and hence the students feel more secure.

## Vet's Voice - Senior Health Screening

#### **'TIS THE SEASON TO BE ITCHY**

The warmer weather is well and truly here and for many of our pets this can bring on skin problems.

#### THE WHY'S

- \* Parasites: Parasites can lead to acute and at times severe skin reactions and self trauma. Fleas are the most common parasite and may potentially affect us too! Other unwanted guests such as sand-flies and mosquitos can also cause problems.
- \* Pollen: From spring through to autumn various trees, weeds and grasses are producing pollen. Just like us, these pollens can cause hay fever in animals (especially dogs). The basic allergic reaction can by itself be a problem or can be the initiating cause of secondary skin, ear and eye infections.
- \* Heat: Heat dehydrates the skin, and encourages sweat or wax (ears) formation, which can help form an ideal environment for secondary infections to establish.

These 3 factors certainly cause some animals to develop skin disease through summer when they are absolutely fine at other times of year. Most commonly this is seen as a contact allergy to the pollen or parasite. For those pets whose skin is an issue all year round, these three factors often make controlling skin disease additionally challenging during summer months.



Wishing you and your pets a Merry Xmas and a Happy New Year.

#### WHAT CAN YOU DO?

First of all, if you notice any of the below factors you should see your vet:

- If the skin, ears or eyes are inflamed (red/ dark pink) and irritating your pet.
- If your pet is very itchy (i.e. he may stop eating or playing to scratch)
- In the event of self trauma (scratching, biting) where the skin is broken.
- You notice a strong smell from the skin or ears.
- There is a coloured discharge from the eyes or any ear discharge.
- Your own efforts are not working.


At Tasman Bay Vets we can help by advising and prescribing medications to help with severe inflammation and infection. We can also offer prescription shampoos, diets and supplements that can genuinely make a huge difference. Lastly, in some situations it is useful to know more about the type of skin disease that your pet is struggling with. There are several diagnostic tests that we can perform to get this extra information which not only may help your pet, but also may allow us to limit the use of medications that can have side effects over time.

#### AT HOME MEASURES

- Parasite control: These days fleas and other external parasites can be very effectively controlled. Our staff can advise you over the counter on the right product(s) for you, taking these nasties out of the equation.
- Other over-the-counter-products: We have a range of skin soothing shampoos and skin supplements that may be of benefit.
- Wash downs: Where pollen contact is an issue (often a rash underneath) then simply washing your pet with water after a period of contact to physically get pollen off the skin can help.
- Bedding: Bedding material itself can be an irritant. Wool and sheepskin based covers and feather/down filling can all be quite allergenic. Also, bedding in general can be a good source of dust mites which are often involved in allergic skin conditions. When washing bedding a hot wash and non-biological detergent should be used. There are also mite repellent covers that can be sourced too.

It's very easy to understand how being itchy can be such an issue for our pets. Just imagine being so irritated that you are driven to itch even when doing something you enjoy and often to the point of causing self trauma. There are a range of ways that you can help when it comes to allergic skin diseases – so don't delay asking our advice so you and your pet(s) can enjoy the warmer weather.


The Trust is happy to report that the preliminary stages of the resource consent process are proceeding very positively and are hopeful to have this finalised before Christmas.


The next stage is to finalise the engineering, now that the stainless steel has been guaranteed through the generosity of Nelson Pine Industries.
