Admin Stuff

The AGM will be held on Wednesday 25th July at 1930 hours in the Multi Purpose Hall at Tasman School.

The Mayor and our Councillors have been invited to attend. In addition to the usual



business, we have asked Fiona Newey, the Executive Officer of the Nelson Tasman Cycle Trails Trust to speak to us about the progress of the cycle trail with particular reference to the business and recreational opportunities this could present to our area. Don't miss the opportunity to hear

about the exciting future of Tasman's Great Taste Trail.

Hamish Rush will be stepping down from the Chair at the AGM, so we will need to elect a new Chairperson. There will also be vacancies on the Board so if you want to take part in the running of the Association, or perhaps could nominate a likely candidate, let me know in advance or come along to the meeting. An additional female member of the Board would be particularly welcome.

The AGM presents an ideal opportunity to raise an issue – with the Board or our Councillors - that is of interest or potential concern to the community as a whole. If there is a topic you would like to raise and discuss, please let me know as soon as possible. Items can be raised at the meeting but only at the Chair's discretion.

To be able to speak and vote at the meeting you need to be a financial member, so if you have not yet paid this year's sub (\$2 per individual and \$5 per family) come armed with the necessary to settle up before the meeting starts. Or, you can pay online, by direct bank transfer –details at the end of the Newsletter.

Local Reserves

Tasman Reserve (off Dicker Road)

Rush Lane has finally been fully repaired and discussions are ongoing to arrange for the vegetation strip between the lane and Aporo Road to be tidied up. A regular maintenance schedule for the Reserve has been established and some more planting has been carried out by TDC.

Tasman Underpass Graffiti

TACA have contacted Chris Finlayson about getting a mural on all or parts of the Tasman Underpass as a deterrent to the graffiti that is appearing. Currently options are being explored to find funding and to work on ways the community can be involved with the painting in the hope that being involved will give ownership and hence deter the graffiti.

Tasman Domain open orchard

Now that the ground work for the pump track is completed, we are looking to continue the planting of productive trees around the Domain to enhance its look and to provide an on-going source of free food for the community. The emphasis for the next planting is on low maintenance tree crops with fruit and nuts that fall when ripe.

So far we have chosen a selection of Walnuts, Pecans and Macadamia nuts for the higher area of the Domain next to the Rush's orchard and feijoas next to the Pump Track. These will also add to the screening of the Pump Track from the Dicker Road houses without getting too big, dropping leaves or casting too much shade. It is hoped to have the trees planted by the middle of July, so they can get away quickly in the spring.

Pump Track

The next big thing to hit Tasman is all but complete with all of the construction now complete and the grass sown on the verges - it's looking great. BUT



and it is a BIG BUT, we can't open the track at the moment partly due to the clay needing time to settle in and the wet weather is not helping this process, so at this point riding on the track will only do damage to the surface and slow the settling process. We have erected an open/closed sign and Tasman School will be holding their annual cross country on the 20th July starting in the Domain and the Fa'avae's will be holding a Pump Track introduction to all those who are keen.

Kina Beach Reserve

With a very busy season over, the Reserve is returning to a more friendly "locals" use. At times during the summer there were so many campers on site that it was difficult to see how Roger and Roseanne could accommodate any more – but generally they did and not too many visitors were turned away disappointed. With the lock-out continuing at Baigent Domain, a number of local groups have now adopted the Reserve as the Sausage Sizzle and BBQ spot for their summer gatherings.

Old Mill Site- Kina Beach Road



The working bees have re-commenced with a major assault on the summer's growth of convolvulus and bidi bidi which is now pretty much under control – re-growth of broom and gorse is manageable but the persistent pampas seedlings continues to be a perennial problem. The next phase will be to continue the formation of the walking track around the site – moving any of our earlier plantings as necessary. If you can spare an hour or so on the first Saturday of each month from 10am do come along and join us – we have an enjoyable morning - usually with tea and buns around 11am – and the satisfaction of knowing that if all goes according to plan, our children and grandchildren will have another recognised Reserve to enjoy in the future.

Kina Beach Road - Blind Bend

Blind Bend Walkway

Well seeing IS believing – and the walkway has been started by TDC. It may not quite be as much as we had hoped for but nevertheless it begins to deal with the major issue of the corner.

We have asked for signage to encourage pedestrians and cyclists to

use the outer edge of the corner and in due course may be able to extend the length of the walkway to make it just that bit more user friendly – BUT a long wait is over and we have the bones of a solution to this dangerous part of our area.

Our submission to Council to reduce the speed limit on the road to 60kph was unsuccessful and it now appears that an 80kph will be applied from the junction with Aporo Road to the present 70kph limit. We still feel this is too fast and

accordingly have proceeded with our plan to erect three "voluntary" speed reduction signs based on pictures chosen by the Mayor from a selection painted by our schoolchildren. Using funds granted by the Lion Foundation and the persuasive "tongue" of Bernard Redshaw to circumvent a seemingly impassable mound of road regulation "red tape", these signs should also be erected in the not too distant future. Many thanks to the landowners who have agreed to let us put them up on their property.

Other Local Works

The Baldwin Road flood relief work is scheduled to proceed in 2012/2013 at a cost of \$417,000. Council have reviewed the speed limits on Aporo Road and whilst this has yet to be confirmed we understand the limit through the village will be 60kph, rising to 80kph at the present 70kph sign, as far as Jester House when it will then rise to 100kph until Ruby Bay (as at present). The decision not to reduce this to 80kph is disappointing, particularly as our local Councillor lobbied hard on our behalf.

Kina Beach Accretion Claim



We continue to support TDC's objection to the application by a beachside property owner on Kina Peninsula Road to lay claim to some 30m of beach in front of the property. While having no objection to the owners verifying their boundary, the photo of 06 June clearly shows the natural boundary between sea and land.



Village Water reticulation

This project is now on hold as a "stand alone" option following the estimation of the significant cost involved on individual households. The provision of good quality drinking water for the village and surrounds is now bound up with the Coastal Pipeline that will take water from the Motueka aquifer to the Waimea Plain. Discussions between Council and concerned parties are ongoing but we have been assured that the Pipeline (along with the Lee Valley dam project) remain top priorities for Council. However, even when all the regulatory hurdles have been overcome there will still remain the question of cost and this will probably manifest itself in additional water rates across the region.

Baigent Domain, Kina Peninsula



The current position of Baigent Domain is in limbo. At this point the mediation process between TDC, Carter Holt Harvey and other 274 parties resulted in CHH rejecting a compromise offered to them by TDC, so the case will go to the Environment Court with a date to set in the future. TACA is unable to be part of this process, so we must sit on the sidelines at this point. However after a couple of discussions with council Staff and the newly appointed CEO, we may have the ability to have our say.

We will keep you all posted on further developments as they come to hand. Here's hoping we have a resolution before the end of the year, so we can enjoy the summer at the beach like we always have.

Children's playground before and after



A few months ago TACA purchased some new palings for the children's playground and material for two gates which has been successfully completed. The work achieved over the last few months has been the difficult task of clearing the overgrowth of honeysuckle on road reserve, by the Packhouse. Next was the clearing of weeds, rubbish and again, honeysuckle from the area opposite the Dicker Road junction with Aporo Rd.

The current project is in the Domain, clearing back low branches and debris to enable the Contractor to mow right to the boundary.

Also the clearing of weeds and gorse from the edges of the drainage ditch and boundary at the south end of the Tasman Domain is in hand. This is to make the area more attractive for the future planting of trees, the other side of the small culvert. Once the Domain ditch is completed, there may be a opportunity for further projects (together with on-going maintenance), so any suggestions from the Community would be welcomed.

Vet's Voice - Sleepy sickness

This is a common disease of sheep at this time of the year and, it's not caused by a hard Saturday night out, but rather by a lack of energy intake in late pregnant ewes. Those readers who have experienced pregnancy can probably empathise with the many thousands of pregnant sheep out there who are so full of baby that they just do not feel like eating. In sheep, bad weather or lack of feed can compound this problem leading the ewe to become wobbly, followed by recumbency and then death.

Fortunately there is a lot we can do to prevent and treat this problem. It is very important at this time of the year to ensure that pregnant ewes have got adequate feed available. If grass is in short supply then good quality hay, baylage or sheep nuts are useful. In ewes that are showing symptoms of sleepy sickness it is important to treat it early and aggressively. Energy is the key factor here and glucose precursors such as glycerol or propylene glycol can be dosed orally. Glucalphos injections are also useful as often sleepy sickness is hard to differentiate from hypocalcaemia and the glucose in this preparation is easily absorbed. Oral rehydration with electrolyte solutions is also useful.

As many of our clients are small block holders, we stock many products such as glucalphos and electrolytes in small pack sizes to keep costs down. We also dispense drenches and 5 n1 vaccines in small lots, so if you only have a few sheep you are not wasting money throwing out unused product.
