From The Chair

Welcome to 2015. As always TACA has had a great year with a number of projects completed and new ones begun. It is truly heartening to see the community work together to improve our



own area and facilities. Whenever we have a working bee, they are well supported (such as Baigents Reserve, Big Beach Clean up and the Mill Point site to name but three). Thank you to the people who have helped with the various projects, those who donate goods and services, the Tasman District Council and of course the committee.

From our studio on Aporo Road, we have seen the cycle trail really being used in the last few months. Those cyclists we have spoken to are very happy with the trail and full of praise. It is a great asset to the area and certainly seeing a lot of cycle traffic. We are also working with the Cycle Trust to get some signage sorted out. The intention is at each end of the village there will be a sign to help show what Tasman has to offer. TACA has agreed to maintain the cycle track from Permin Road to the Tasman Domain, so we will be developing a plan to keep the weeds down, make sure the signage is in place and that it is a safe track to use. If you see anything that needs to be resolved, please let me or someone from TACA know and we will get it sorted out.

In the last three months of 2014, we began working with TDC to resolve the condition of Tasman View Road (from Harley Road to the Bypass). A number of homes are on this road now, and for those who have driven it, the condition of the road is not great. The road is not TDC maintained currently and we are working with TDC to see what needs to be done in order to get it

maintained. So hopefully in 2015 the road will have a better surface with less car swallowing potholes.

A number of the businesses in Tasman would like to see improved main road signage. Driven by Steve from Fullmer Gallery and Julie from Kina Cliffs Vineyard, they are working with the various authorities to get this done. The sign is to include the wineries, art galleries and Jester House Café. The first large sign proved to be simply too expensive for the local businesses to fund. The group is currently working on a smaller simpler sign, which is currently being quoted and designed.

For a small community, Tasman achieves a lot. And all those who help and participate can be proud of our efforts. Here's to a superb 2015.

Admin Stuff

Well the AGM seems a long time ago but I remember it well – it coincided with our 44th Wedding Anniversary – so a celebratory meal had to be postponed for a few days! The Board was re-elected with Tony Clark continuing as



Chairman and Ewen and I in our respective roles, although, with Ewen planning to move to Nelson, we will be in need of a new Treasurer in the not too distant future – any takers? There is still a vacant seat on the Board so if you feel you are able to make a contribution to the Community through TACA, do please contact Tony Clark or myself – it's not an onerous duty but rather one that brings great rewards of satisfaction and friendship.

The meeting acknowledged the huge contribution made by Hamish Rush, David Easton and Ron Oliver in leading the effort to return Baigent's Reserve to public ownership, an achievement our Community can be proud of. A healthy and sound Financial Report was approved by the meeting and we met Richard Hilton, recently appointed as the TDC Horticultural Officer to assist Beryl Wilkes. Richard is now our "go to" man for all matters affecting local Reserves, Campsites and Playgrounds and has become well involved in our working bees and "tidy up" activities. In addition to progressing our own projects we have been in contact with the Tasman Bible School and Church to work together on future possible events for the Community and to follow up on the information received from the Community Survey they organised under our auspices.

A new Community Group has been formed covering the Moutere Hills area and we have assisted them in setting up their organisation, directing them to finance sources and exchanging ideas and input on such topics as the potential impact of the Waimea Community Dam on local water supply issues. We ended the year with the Treasurer confirming that TDC had not only continued to support us financially with another year's operating grant but had also provided \$1500 towards Shade Sails and picnic tables for Baigents Reserve – we appreciate their continued support in what are clearly tight financial circumstances all round for Council.

We were not able to persuade Council to further reduce the speed limit through the village although the 80kph limit will be extended from the Bluffs to just before Pine Hill Road – much to the relief of many of us who found slowing to 60kph at the bottom of the Bluffs a bit of a struggle!

The Big Beach Clean Up

Responding to DOC's request to clean up our local stretch of the inlet 35 volunteers got down and dirty for a couple of hours on Saturday 1st November. We split up into 5 teams and divided the inlet shore (both side of the highway!) up between us. We sent two very full trailer loads of rubbish to the compactor later that morning and then retired to the Tasman Store to enjoy a coffee courtesy of TACA. A great success with most participants





signing up for a repeat operation next year.

Local Reserves

Tasman Reserve

Additional Bike Leaners have been installed and a refurbishment of the Playground is underway (details below). We have named the area of the Reserve between the Bridge and the Underpass the "Underpass Spinney" and little by little we are getting the new planting established and the grass growth under control.

Tasman Domain Playground Upgrade



You may have noticed a few changes at the playground recently. The old fort has been strengthened and made safer with a wooden ladder and railings. A new slide is on its way (and may well have been installed by the time you read this) and a clatterbridge will eventually be built from the fort through the trees to the Domain.



The old swings have been removed and will be replaced by a new swing set plus an awesome 2m climbing frame. Over the next year or two we hope to receive additional funding to upgrade the rest of the playground but, thanks to the hard work of Tony Pearson, Bruce Sladen, Tony Clark and Roger Percival, the playground will soon be a fantastic space for children to play in.

Kina Beach Reserve

If you have visited over the holidays, you will have seen that this Reserve is still as popular as ever. We are in discussion with Council about drainage improvements for the winter and also an upgrade to the BBQ facilities – times are tough when it comes to getting funds for these sort of projects but, as they say, it's the creaking door that gets oiled, so we will persist!

Mill Point site (formerly known as the Old Mill site)

As it was pointed out that the Mill was in fact on the other side of Kina Beach Road, it was felt appropriate to make a small name change



modification! Alongside the ongoing tasks of weed control (Gorse, Broom and Convolvulus) a couple of improvements are worth noting. Thanks to the generosity of the owners of Joint Works (Tony and Jane Clark) the entrances to the various walkways that are being developed through the area are now marked by splendid posts, although after



they had been installed some "bright spark" thought one of them might look better upside down. It's disappointing for the Team to see their hard work undone by thoughtless vandalism but I suppose every community has its share of idiots – they had just better not let me catch them at it!

Entry to the site (particularly tricky in the winter months) is now much improved thanks to the installation of a new culvert with materials paid jointly by TDC and TACA – a great effort. Working bees have now stopped until March.

Tasman Store, Aporo Road, Tasman

What a cracking summer we've had! The weather has been stunning, visitors are flocking to the area and the Store has been humming. One group of visitors described the Store as 'the best kept secret' and they became happy regulars whilst enjoying their stay in our amazing area. Fresh Mahana boysenberries and Moutere strawberries have been a huge hit whilst our infamous cheese scones have built up a dedicated following. Back in October Lance won another silver award for his coffee at the NZ Coffee Awards - again a huge achievement for a small time







roaster against the bigger companies. This year Lance is going for gold! We are very proud to be able to supply coffee that is so fresh; you just can't beat a coffee made from beans that are at their best a couple of days after roasting. In November we said farewell to Vanessa who took a job closer to home but welcomed Kris, who used to own the Upper Moutere Store and Annie, a nursing student who unfortunately for us has to return to university at the end of the holidays. Autumn joined us recently and is a keen baker and coffee maker, so it is set to be a good year. The last term of school was an eventful one, starting with the masked parade in the first week of term 4, where huge input from parents/students and staff saw the school taking out the Best School award plus the 'Supreme award' which was presented by Dame Suzie Moncrieff. The other major event of the last term was that the school has gained the status of 'Silver' in the enviro schools program. This

came about from mainly on-going enviro awareness from each class, and a meeting with the enviro officer for TDC, Adie Leng, who took Room 4 through a process of engaging with the activities they/we had accomplished over the years, and reflections on what this meant for them. It was a great process in which the students took on ownership of the school enviro projects.

Room 4 also contributed to this award by engaging in small group environmental topics as an inquiry lesson. Topics such as recycling, packaging, composting, global pollution were tackled alongside the pollution of our own local stream and estuary. The group that researched our own estuary consisting of Sebastian Van Veen, Thomas Schwarzenbach, and Theo Gabities, gave a 10 minute presentation of their research to the Tasman District Council. The feedback from this presentation was very positive. This group found out really interesting facts about the composition of the water (see also again the pictures on Facebook with the three boys at the Cawthron Institute testing the water) and who contributes to its pollution!







Lastly, we farewelled eight year 8 students from our school at the end of year concert. Eight students who will be missed, but eight students who we are proud to call graduates in their work and in their character.

It's that wonderful time of year where we and our pets get more active; swimming, running, kayaking (don't forget your dog's life jacket too!) and walking. However this means our dogs tend to be out in the heat that bit more. Be aware of making sure you have plenty of water for both you and your dog so you avoid having an over-cooked, parched pooch! 
Tasman Bible Church – January 2015

Baigent Reserve, Kina Peninsula



It's been another productive year at Baigents Reserve we have been working with local community individuals and the TDC to continue the improvement of this great piece of coastline. Many thanks must go to all those who have helped through the year and at the annual working bee which was held in late November. Thanks to PF Olsen for providing three of their qualified men for the day earlier to chainsaw down the trees, to be mulched by the eager team of volunteers assisted by the Nelmac guys and their mulcher. Although it was wet that day it didn't dampen the enthusiasm



and it was a great result. We did not get the painting of the toilets done due to the rain but they have been given a clean up and will look great after the paint is on.



The five families involved in the boat shed project have worked with Council this year to complete an agreement that will allow them to apply for building consent and then ultimately build the sheds when they choose to.

The security of the reserve still remains a concern and there is an intention to lock the gate morning and night. However, how this will finally be organised and then paid for is still in the planning stage (see below). A solar powered light will be erected at the gate to stop anyone driving into it at night, and provide some security to the individual that will be responsible for locking the gate in the future.

TACA have received a grant of \$18,000 from the Canterbury Community Trust for the purchase of a fully wheelchair accessible toilet for the Reserve. TDC have undertaken to install and maintain the toilet. The location and timing of installation have yet to be determined – probably after the holiday period. This grant adds to the \$3000 received from Network Tasman towards Shade Sails and the \$1500 from Council for BBQ tables and towards Shade sails. Both facilities will be a welcome addition to the Reserve.

Baigent's Reserve Security Gate

The entrance gate to the Reserve will, like Rabbit Island, be closed during night time hours. Due to unforeseen circumstances, the plan to extend the duties of the Kina Camp Site managers, to include this task, cannot now happen and so TDC are looking at alternatives. If you (perhaps in conjunction with a couple of friends/neighbours to spread the load) live in the vicinity of the Reserve and would be willing to take on this (PAID) task, please contact Beryl Wiles, Reserves Manager, at TDC Richmond 03 543 8400.
